Extra questions and answers from 'No Men Are Foreign'

1. What does the poet emphasise by beginning and ending the poem with the same line?

Answer: When a word, phrase, clause, or sentence is repeated, the repetition is for the emphasis. The poet's intention is to drive home the truth that thinking of people of foreign countries as strangers is an unnecessary man-made barrier that should be broken.

2. What happens when war breaks out?

Answer: When we wage war and use dreadful weapons against, others, we defile our own earth. The dust and smoke of guns pollute the very air we breathe.

3. What does a peaceful harvest refer to?

Answer: Peaceful harvest refers to peacetime and the prosperity one has in times of peace.
