I. Four alternatives are given for each of the following questions / incomplete statements. Only one of them is correct or most appropriate. Choose the correct alternative and write the complete answer along with its letter of alphabet : $6 \times 1 = 6$

1. I had ___ interview with the novelist and ___ critic.

Answer: (C) *an, the*

Explanation: "Interview" begins with a vowel sound, so we use 'an'. "Critic" is specific, so we use 'the'.

2. Many people quarrelled ___ themselves.

Answer: (A) *among*

Explanation: "Among" is used when referring to more than two people. "Between" is for two people.

3. A cup of coffee comes by choice. (Identify the figure of speech)

Answer: (B) *Metaphor*

Explanation: There is a hidden comparison between "coffee" and "choice" without using "like" or "as".

4. My father loves taking tea every morning, ___? (Choose the correct question tag)

Answer: (B) *doesn't he?*

Explanation: The sentence is positive, so the tag should be negative. "Loves" is in the simple present tense, so we use "does".

5. The court ___ that she was innocent. (Choose the correct verb)

Answer: (B) *declared*

Explanation: "Declared" is the correct past tense verb that fits grammatically.

6. To cut off a part of a person's infected body, identify the appropriate medical word.

Answer: (C) *Amputate*

Explanation: "Amputate" means to surgically remove a body part due to infection or injury.

7. Enfold : Embrace :: Veiled : ?

- Answer: *Concealed*
- Explanation: "Enfold" means to wrap or cover, similar to "Embrace." Likewise, "Veiled" means covered or hidden, and "Concealed" is its synonym.

8. Terrestrial : Celestial :: Fact : ?

- Answer: *Fiction*
- Explanation: "Terrestrial" (earthly) is the opposite of "Celestial" (heavenly). Similarly, "Fact" (truth) is the opposite of "Fiction" (imaginary).

9. Meet : Meat :: Check : ?

- Answer: *Cheque*
- Explanation: "Meet" (gather) and "Meat" (food) are homophones (same pronunciation, different meanings). Similarly, "Check" (verify) and "Cheque" (bank document) are homophones.

10. Movement : Move :: Beauty : ?

- Answer: *Beautiful*
- Explanation: "Movement" is the noun form of "Move" (verb). Likewise, "Beauty" (noun) corresponds to "Beautiful" (adjective).

Answer: *The loan is being given by the bank.*

Explanation: Convert from active to passive voice by making the object (*the loan*) the subject of the sentence.

Answer: *Where did Dakshina Murthy attend the conference?*

Explanation: Form a question that leads to the underlined phrase (*in Mumbai*) as the answer.

Answer: *Nature is very beautiful.*

Explanation: *Exclamatory sentences express strong emotions.*

- *To convert it to an assertive sentence, we remove "How" and rephrase it normally.*
- *"Very" is added to retain the emphasis.*

19. Explain the qualities of Lochinvar and the bridegroom.

Answer: *Lochinvar was brave, fearless, and determined, whereas the bridegroom was timid, hesitant, and lacked courage. Lochinvar boldly arrived at the wedding to claim his love, while the bridegroom was passive and weak.*

20. The approach of the Sexton and the Postman to the game is typical of their profession. Explain.

Answer: *The Sexton, being a serious and disciplined person, played the game cautiously and methodically. The Postman, always in a hurry due to his job, played in a rushed and careless manner, reflecting their respective professional habits.*

21. How is the callousness of the bird killers brought out in the poem?

Answer: *Parasurama cursed Karna because Karna had deceived him by pretending to be a Brahmin. When Parasurama discovered the truth, he cursed Karna that he would forget the knowledge of using the Brahmastra at a crucial moment in battle.*

24. Why did Ulysses with his twelve chosen party go to Cyclop's land?

Answer: *Ulysses and his twelve chosen men went to Cyclop's land in search of food and shelter during their long voyage. They were unaware of the dangers ahead and entered the cave of Polyphemus, the Cyclops.*

Explanation:

- Positive Degree compares without using "more" or "most."
- Comparative Degree uses "greater than" to show comparison.
- Superlative Degree (given in the question) uses "one of the greatest."

26. Change the following sentence to reported speech:

Reported Speech: *Murthy said that he had taught English in his school.*

Explanation:

- The verb "taught" (past tense) changes to "had taught" (past perfect) in reported speech.
- The pronoun "I" changes to "he" (since Murthy is being referred to).

Sentence: *The thief saw the police. He ran away.*

Using "As soon as":

Answer: *As soon as the thief saw the police, he ran away.*

Using "No sooner... than":

Explanation:

- "As soon as" is used for quick actions happening one after another.
- "No sooner... than" is used in an inverted structure with "did" + verb (see → did see).
